## Judge's Remarks Pittsford Art Group Annual Spring Show 2018

#### **Show Comments**

What was the judge thinking? That is a question often thought, if not asked, so this summary is intended to provide some insight. What catches my eye and appeals to me will differ from others, and this is clearly an artist's opinion of the work of others.

This exhibit is collectively an excellent representation of work from a talented group. There were several that were close to being awarded, but with the numbers, missed by a nose. As the judge, I invite members and guests to take some time to enjoy this exhibit, as there are a lot of gems, even beyond those that were recognized with awards.

#### **Best of Show**

Hall Service Truck caught my eye right away and is a substantial piece from across the room. The calligraphy in the bramble along with the patina on the truck serve well to indicate the passage of time. The vignette effect of the foreground and background provide the viewer ease in taking a moment to wonder about the history of this retired workhorse.

### Judge's Awards

*The Misfit* is aptly titled and painted nicely. The composition is arranged well to define the shape of the subject among the rest of the scene, supported by strong values and a sense of light to define the forms.

*Purple Profusion* is an excellent choice of medium, handled confidently to communicate the blooms expressively and energetically. The range of values was chosen well, without gratuitous rendering or giving the viewer more than needed.

Fallen Leaves left me wanting to see more by this artist. The medium contributes to the abstraction, and with bold color, it's a striking piece.

*Irises* is a celebration of spontaneity. Often drippy turpentine washes can just look sloppy, but this piece holds up very well, as the underpainting establishes strength in values and the overpainting finishes it just enough to give a fresh feeling.

*Tibetan Girl* is a textural delight. There are some great choices in color and value, including some courageous ones that truly contribute to the strength of this painting.

*The Strut* is an energetic piece that captures the sense of life of the subjects. Often chickens are at rest when they're portrayed, but observation reveals that they're rarely still, and that adds a lot of interest in this piece.

#### **Merit Awards**

San Miguel is a disciplined drawing that compels the viewer to appreciate the architecture through the eye of the artist. The efficiency of rendering this beautiful structure from lights and darks out of middle grey adds to the interest.


*Pemaquid Sunrise* is a strong painting, which not every painter is willing to take on, given the historical familiarity and requirement to observe. The sense of presence of a Maine coastal morning is nicely captured, contrasting the rocky point with a wonderfully painted sky.

*Riverview* is a lovely little gem and an excellent example of the rewards of working small. The unlabored rendering invites the viewer to enjoy the serenity that this piece conveys.

*Frozen Pond* celebrates winter, establishing the beauty of the snow with cool shadowy washes, contrasted in value and color temperature with the trees and grasses. This painting is a good example of why one paints a winter scene, which might be quite ordinary in other seasons.

*Mexican Gulls* has a peaceful quality that is enhanced by the medium. This trio of characters is a fabulous subject, supported (literally) by a nicely painted dock, bearing cues of structure that create interest. Technically it exhibits excellent choices in values, composition, and color temperature, painted freely.

*Happy Flowers* is the best submission by this artist, clearly seeking to represent with abstraction. The title is perfect, and the choices in value, color, and design contribute to the strength of this piece.
