
Our picnic this year will be a paint out on June 6, 10-2. We will meet at the Port of Pittsford.

Grant Lounsbury











Grant Lounsbury is from Canada and

teaches at the Memorial Art Gallery and in Penn Yan. He worked on "Anastasia" by Disney and he will be visiting Ireland this summer for a Plein Air competition. He was a firefighter and paramedic in Arizona and is currently a firefighter in Geneva.

When he teaches to art students he stresses that all objects are comprised of 4 basic shapes; circle, triangle, square and rectangle. His drawings combine illustration and animation. Every living organism looks like it is motion or getting ready to move. (breathing) He will soften a birds' wings to make it appear to be flying. His impressionistic style is very loose and colorful. His backgrounds do not concern him. He tries to open his mind and let it happen, often though the background repeats a color from the subject and/or is done in a complementary color. He leaves "negative space for movement, excitement and life." He finishes the background after the subject is finished and will cut into them.

He adds his color interest in the background with light like Turner did. Grant does give the faces of his animals great attention and detail. He wants to make them look alive and breathing.

Grant paints on smooth masonite, canvas board and wood. He likes the feel of it. He primes with house primer paint. He sketches first, outlines his drawing and then starts filling in with color. He uses Liquin to paint and then varnishes them when dry to protect. He recently added Richeson paints to his palette and basically starts with 3 blue,

3 red and 3 yellow. He recently found a special purple and Richeson brilliant yellow white. He does not have a set color for his backgrounds and his outlines have a "dark inky" quality using thin and thick lines.

Grant describes his work in progress as a "war zone". I think we can all relate to that feeling as we work our canvases to reach completion. He reminded us he always does a thumbnail sketch first, planning his battle sketches. "Keep on fighting through the ugly stage to win the war to victory!" He takes pictures of his paintings step by step and he saves his older paintings because he does find them interesting. He takes time when finishing a painting to highlight eyes and/or fur- feathers, and adds shadows around eyes. Grant was so well liked he may be asked to return in the fall.
