
A Message from the Vice President, Betsy Liano

Pittsford Art Group

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Zoom Meeting Etiquette

- 1. **Don't be late**. This will also give you the opportunity to test your volume and video prior to the meeting. I set an alarm on my phone to remind me. We all get busy and our memories unreliable. Find a strategy that works for you. If you are late, please do not interrupt the meeting. You can text someone off screen to learn what you missed, if necessary.
- 2. Mute your microphone at all times unless open for questions/comments. ReMute after you have spoken. Background noises are inevitable, vocal and environmental: phones, other house companions (dogs/cats/partners), shuffling papers, etc..are very distracting to other participants. Noise also causes the video to shift focus to your screen. We all want to see the presentation not a blank screen or miscellaneous scenes.
- 3. Designate a moderator for questions/comments. This alleviates redundancy and provides the presenter with consistency.
- 4. Do not put private or irrelevant messages in chat space, use another device to communicate with others.
- 5. If you need to **leave early**, just note it in the chat and wave goodbye, no need to interrupt the presentation.

Fortunately our meetings are not required to be participatory, so you can leave your video off if you prefer and just type in comments for the moderator to communicate on your behalf. One of our members encountered technical difficulties, but was able to solve the problem in a way that was recommended online. If your internet system is lagging or skipping, you can use your computer for video and phone for audio. This may also be a good solution for those whose devices are not sufficiently loud enough for them to hear the presenter. I completely understand the frustration with high tech devices (my kids will tell you tales of my many threats to throw the computer out the window). However, our meeting time is not the moment to attempt to solve those problems. You can try to solicit advice off screen.

Oil Painting by Presenter: Brent Dodd

Brent lives north of Cape Town in Durbin, South Africa. He started out discussing his color palette as he began an abstract painting of Jackalberry trees. Mixing the color first and then finding it again when you run out can be difficult. He suggests blending from light to dark and uses a palette knife to mix the paints on the palette. He likes to work with color theory with strong contrast to create a greater sense of depth that will stop people in their tracks. "You serve your talent, it doesn't serve you". Use the rule of thirds when composing your work. To get started, block in the canvas in the first few minutes. He used horizontal cross-hatching in the foreground compared to diagonal in the body of the work. Brent uses a filbert No. 14 brush - sable with synthetic hairs. He added more sap green and orange to compose the foreground and also added more contrast to the foreground with blues. His brush strokes are scrubbing in nature and quite fast.



The BIG 5 Rule: setup should take no longer than 5 minutes, palette should have 5 colors (which includes white!), no more than 5 hours of painting (you will begin losing concentration, taking shortcuts, and contaminating the palette), create 5 artworks in 5 weeks, and find 5 other artists to have an exhibition!

"The late Simon Combes, a Kenyan painter inspired my early understanding of light and colour in Africa. His painting technique of a clean and simple palette of colour was instructued under the guidance of David Shepherd a painter from the United Kingdom who started a lot of wildlife conservation initiatives. Both of the aforementioned artists influenced my mentor Larry Norton, a Zimbabwean artist who I grew up with and studied under. All of their styles are wildlife related, meaning the colours and environments of Africa. Lately I have moved more into understanding how those palettes of colour can be applied to a wide variety of genres. So, it's more an application of a painting technique to different subject matters."

The darkest foreground colors are composed of the darkest variations of the midground tones.

Oil Painting by Presenter: Brent Dodd

Brent added more white into the midground and then took a larger brush and dragged it down diagonally across the middle to show sun light rays shining through the trees. Brent then 'fluffed over' the midground, blending in and making the scrubbed in paints nice and smooth.

5 paint colors used in this painting: Magenta, Sap Green, Prussian Blue, Cadmium Yellow, and White. If you don't get the color right, abstract or realist, it will not look right.

Brent then took the same dark colors that were used in the foreground and began filling in the top of the canvas above the trees. He switched to a palette knife to put paint into the top and at the very bottom of the foreground - very dark. He then switched to a brush to smooth over the top of the canvas - loves the strong contrast! Don't produce boring hotel, elevator art! He uses the side of the brush and drags down the dark color from the top (jackalberry tree) - elephants love grabbing the 'sausage' hanging on the tree. He then picked up white from the palette and added 'light' to the top of the trees - creating negative space, while wiping off the brush to not contaminate the source paint. Brent then added more details to the midground with more contrast. The absence or presence of light is what you should practice capturing. You should observe it in realtime. Look at the colors and watch how the light changes every 15 minutes.

Brent stated that his first exhibition in 2001 was a failure. After 11 years he met someone in Botswana that had a studio in San Antonio, TX where he had a sell-out show. In 2013 he had a show in NYC.

Brent does travel a lot on the weekends in the bush (woods) and safari since the weather is never a problem in South Africa. He would like to show us how to paint the African sunsets using the African colors - oranges and reds, yellows, blues. We have invited him back in the Fall 2021!
