SOLO SHOW "A Different Point of View" by Club Member, David Gardner

"The act of designing and creating art has been the theme of my life." David has been drawing, painting, designing, and making art for over 50 years. He was trained as an architect in Minnesota, taking many art classes at the University of Minnesota. He continued his art training at the Minneapolis College of Art & Design. He worked as an architect and commercial illustrator for several years in Minneapolis before moving back to his hometown, Rochester, NY where he designed many buildings around New York while operating his architectural firm before merging with a large national firm in 2017.



Since he retired from architecture in 2020, Dave has been on the faculty of Rochester's Memorial Art Gallery Creative Workshop, teaching intermediate drawing and beginning through advanced watercolor painting. As a teacher, he draws upon his experience, learning from Fred Lipp, Dick Kane, Jeanne Lindsay, and g.a. Shelleras well as studying with national artists such as David Taylor, Steve Rogers, Skip Lawrence, Ted Nuttall, Eudes Correia and Mary Whyte.

Dave's primary medium is watercolor, which he uses spontaneously or alla-prima. His work is ever evolving; sometimes impressionistic, other times graphic, and many times playful and imaginative.

Dave belongs to many local and national watercolor associations. His work has received numerous local and national awards.

RECENT EVENTS

JANUARY MEETING

Speaker Kevin Feary

The January Meeting featured speaker Kevin Feary who did an outstanding job, creating a winter scene for us, explaining every step along the way.

He shared his choice of paints, how he focuses on value rather than color, and how he uses a View Finder for cropping a scene, and small sketches to develop an appealing composition before every putting rush to canvas.

In his example painting, Kevin talked about "radial" composition and how he in a subtle way, he draws your eye to the focal point of his painting. He then focuses on big and simple shapes and roughs them onto the canvas. A typical painting has no more than 4 or 5 big shapes.

To get the proper values, Kevin often refers to a 'value card' – a small card with different gray scale sections of differing values. By holding that up to the painting and squinting, he can assess where he is on the value scale and make sure that his colors are balanced, and value is appropriate for the depth he is aiming for.

Kevin also spoke about keeping colors, especially those for the sky, clean and unmuddied. He does this by not only being careful, but also using separate brushes for anything related to the sky.

By the end of the meeting, Kevin had produced a compelling. Realistic but impressionistic, rendering of a snow-covered field with rolling hills and trees in the distance. Thank you, Kevin!

About Kevin

Kevin has taken classes and workshops from local and nationally known artists throughout his career and has been honing his skills studying, drawing and painting. Kevin co-organizes a weekly open studio with a live model on Thursday afternoons. He creates commissioned pieces, murals and paints from life through figure/portrait sessions and plein air. He teaches plein air and portrait workshops and demonstrates for art groups locally and across America.

Kevin is a member of The All-Weather Gang, Batavia Society of Artists, signature member of the Genesee Valley Plein Air Painters, signature member of the Rochester Art Club, founding member of the New York Figure Study Guild, associate member of the Oil Painters of America, and an associate member of the National Oil and Acrylic Painters Society.

Welcome

Margie Mitchell, President, opened the business meeting at 7:10 pm and welcomed a guest, Lois Glaser, a photographer who is studying painting and is interested in PAG membership.

Recording Secretary

Joe emphasized that he is happy to chat with anyone who may be interested in taking over some or all of the above duties.


Rotating Community Exhibits

PRODUCT & BOOK REVIEW



At the December Meeting, speaker Dale Terbush spoke about a brand of Acrylic Paints by "Nova Color" in California. I decided to give them a try and checked out their web site: https://novacolorpaint.com/

First off, they have a lot of color choices! To make the selection process easier, they also have created a unique and interesting set of "Bundles" by practicing artists who paint in a variety of ways. The bundles include 7 or 8 compatible and related colors suitable for different styles of painting. I almost went that route with a collection of landscape colors, but ultimately decided to pick out 5 colors on my own and bought 8 oz tubs of ...

- Phthalo Turquoise (an amazing Ceridian-like blue but better)
- Magenta (looks purplish in tub but very bright magenta on canvas)
- Medium Violet (purple)
- Azo Yellow (a bright yellow)
- Indian Yellow (an orange color)

Prices were comparable to other acrylic paints that you might buy on Blick or at Michael's. For me the big difference is intensity of color and consistency. The Nova colors were very intense, much more than I was used to.

Typically, I use "heavy body" acrylics that are thick and pasty. The Nova Color paints are very creamy, like melted butter. I found that a little goes a long way and they don't dry out as quickly on my palette as the heavy body paints do. They also don't have the covering capability that I am used to with a thick glob of heavy body paints — so I found that when I used them, I typically used the Nova Colors as a sort of base coat, to rough in my painting, and then used heavy body over it as needed. For many of you however, who do not paint "heavy" like I do, I think you will find both the consistency and coverage to be excellent.

In summary – I would buy Nova Colors again and am already scoping out a few colors to try. They offer a broad selection of colors, not cheap, but competitive, and the intensity was amazing. For my painting style I will not exclusively use them – but I will use them as a base coat to rough in a composition and to mix with my heavy body colors. If anyone would like to see them "in person" let me know and I can bring them to a meeting.

AN ARTIST YOU MAY LIKE

ARTIST: Frederick Judd Waugh




Frederick Judd Waugh was born in 1861 in Bordentown, New Jersey. He studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts with Thomas Eakins and at the Académie Julian in Paris with Adolphe-William Bouguereau. After his studies he moved to England, residing on the island of Sark in the English Channel where he made his living as a seascape painter. He returned to the U.S. in 1908, settling in Montclair Heights, New Jersey, later living on Bailey Island, Maine and in Provincetown, Massachusetts. During WWI he served in the Navy as a camouflage painter of ships. During his career he established himself as the most popular marine painter in the country and was elected a full member of the National Academy of Design. Frederick Waugh died in Provincetown, Massachusetts on Sept 10, 1940, at age seventy-nine.
