UPCOMING CLUB EVENTS

PAG Summer Picnic – Saturday June 8th, 10:00AM to 4:00PM At the Devils Bathtub Pavilion at Mendon Ponds Park

This year's summer picnic will be held at the Devil's Bathtub in Mendon Ponds Park. Mendon Ponds Park is on the National Registry of Natural Landmarks because of its geologic history and presence of significant geological features left from the ice age — including Devil's Bathtub, which despite its polarizing name, is a fascinating, rare phenomenon in nature. It is a meromictic pond, meaning that the layers in the water do not mix nor do they "turn over" like most ponds do each spring and fall. This is due to the depth — roughly 47 feet at its deepest point — and protection by the geologic features around it. We have reserved the pavilion at the top of the hill by the stair way to the Bathtub.






And ... the PICNIC SPEAKER will be Kathleen Giles

May MEETING

Speaker Nancy Lane

The May Meeting featured speaker Nancy Lane. Website: https://www.nancylanestudio.com/



Nancy produced a watercolor landscape of a seacoast at sunset. She demonstrated how color and brushstroke can be used to add motion to the evening sky – and then how color and reflections can bring out the drama of the scene.





Note the brush sizes and how Nancy utilized as big of bruhes as she could, saving the small brisues for details later. You can also see in the photos above how Nancy utilizes two tubs of water – one for a "ciarse wash" of the brushand the sceond for a clean wash.

You should also note the color guide on the upper-right corner of the painting. This technique is a great way to remain true to your colors when mixing additional pigment on your pallette.



For her paints, Nancy used Windsor Newton Professional Watercolor, including this shade of "sky blue" (*Indanthrene Blue*). Note that this is also available in Acrylic by Windsor Newton.

MEMBER PROFILE

MEMBER: Mike Kamish



Born in Chicago as the middle child of a family of 5, I have always had an interest in creative things ... including science, model ships, painting, and writing. Between my chemistry lab in the basement, my science fiction and detective "novels" and my "Frank Frazetta style" fantasy art drawings – I was always working on some project or another.

I suppose I inherited that from a family of very active people with diverse interests. My father was a "jack of all trades", working as a plumber by day, fixing TVs and electronics at night, and among his many projects, somehow managing to build a darkroom where we worked together on photography. My mother was an accomplished piano player and dabbled in oils and painting murals on the side. Somewhere in there they were scout leaders as well. I guess none of us ever slept ...

The exposure to many creative fields led me to major in engineering in college and eventually move to Rochester for a co-op position as an engineer at Kodak. There I met my soon-to-be-wife Jan, and before long Kodak offered me a full-time position. Kodak was booming at the time, and I landed in a place where I had the unique opportunity to work on a vast array of things, travel to Kodak sites worldwide, and learn how to work independently.


After getting my Master's, my wife and I then took the next step, and started our own software company, producing manufacturing systems for places like Kodak and Xerox, security systems for museums like the Metropolitan Museum of Art and Getty Museum, aircraft testing systems for the FAA, and ultimately health care and clinical research systems for the Veteran Administration and health systems like URMC. It was a busy and exciting time for us creating and building the company while raising our daughter Jen, and as you'd expect, hobbies were not a priority.


But as the business and the daughter both matured, we had more time and before long I was building model ships again and started to dabble again in painting. Ship building was the hobby of choice for about 25 years, and I built over a dozen models and to this day, am still an active member of a model ship club "Model Shipwrights of Western New York"

(https://www.modelshipwrightguildwny.org/). We finally sold the software business about 5 or 6 years ago, and even though we started another one (once you've had a business it's hard to stop), painting has risen to the top of my list of hobbies and as I cut back more and more on working, I have been able to spend more and more time on painting.

As part of my painting "rebirth", I started by creating paintings of photos of friends and family, like these below (the one on the right is my self-portrait!)







But I soon started to experiment with landscapes. I always enjoyed the look of paintings with texture and at one point, reached out to a Canadian artist, Miguel Freitas, to ask him how he achieves the texture in his paintings. He graciously shared with me how

he used Impasto Gel and other similar materials to thicken the paint. I experimented with that technique, then at some point started to play with Heavy Gesso, and ultimately came up with my current method of precoating the canvas with a thick layer of gesso. I like the texture and the sometimes-fortuitous effect of the bumps and puddles the gesso forms when dry.

Currently my work is primarily landscape (though PAG member Ron Boehner and I have been discussing once again experimenting with producing some "Frazetta like" paintings to shake things up a bit! For those of you that do not know the artist, he is considered the "father" of fantasy art, with some paintings selling in the millions of \$. Here are thumbnails of a couple to give you an idea).
