## **UPCOMING & CURRENT CLUB EVENTS**

### PAG February 6th Regular Meeting at The Pittsford Community Center

Speaker: Pat DeLuca (https://www.patdeluca.art/)



Pat Deluca is an encaustic artist. For those of you unfamiliar, encaustic painting, also known as hot wax painting, is a form of painting that involves a heated wax medium to which colored pigments have been added. The molten mix is applied to a surface—usually prepared wood, though canvas and other materials are sometimes used.

Unlike an oil painter, water colorist, or acrylic painter who mix colors on a palette. In contrast, the "palette" of an encaustic artist is a hot plate, the "colors" are pigmented encaustic.

Another difference between encaustic and traditional painting is that encaustic paintings have many layers of encaustic applied to the surface, one on top of the other, with each layer being separately fused in. This technique results in a depth and luminous translucency that is unique to encaustic art.

Pat describes herself as follows:

Like so many creatives and makers I know and love, I'm an artist because I don't have a choice. My paintings are there, waiting for me, floating at the edges of everything I hear, I see, I sense, and I dream. I listen in color. I'm often caught staring because I get distracted by the shape of a cupids bow or

the shadows dancing across a person's face. And yea, that could be me along the side of the road because a cloud is too interesting to pass by.

You might notice that I tend to work with the color blue. Blue is the color of life and hope. Every hue and shade of blue inspires me. I'm equally taken with the properties of water and sky that make those colors possible.

What excites me the most though is the wonderful wavy, sometimes obscured edges between earth, water and sky. I think about blurred lines and shifting edges - a lot. That work and the ongoing exploration of them is what you'll find here.

My mantra. As an artist - remember that no one will ever be able to put together exactly those colors or make that same stroke or line but you! It's kind of a miracle. It's humbling. It's my gift to the world to be able to share it.

# **NEXT SHOW @ Barnes & Noble: Chairpersons Needed**

The next big group show is at Barnes & Noble in the spring. Debi & Mike have chaired the last few shows with the assistance of

- Joanne (wall cards)
- Nina (prospectus)
- Sylvia & Margie (Certificates)
- Debi (also Ribbons in addition to being co-chair)

Plus, multiple volunteers for setup, takedown, and the award reception.

We're all willing to help again – but are looking for two new co-chairs to lead the effort (with Mike & Debi's support).

The specific responsibilities and activities performed by the Show chairs are:

#### • Show Preparation

- O Confirm show dates with Barnes and Noble coordinator and determine with the coordinator what we need for the reception (its usually the store manager who confirms the dates a super nice guy)
- Identify a judge (this is the most challenging item but also can be a lot of fun too). In previous years we:
  - Looked at local clubs and galleries and identified some well-respected artists as candidates
  - Reached out to the top candidates and in each case they said "yes".
  - We then confirmed dates and expectations and had our judge.
- Prepare the prospectus by copying the old one and updating it with:
  - Show dates, drop off and pick up times, reception date, the Judge, and other changes as needed
- The Secretary (currently Joe but hopefully another soon) will send out the Prospectus and create a blank paintings document on the Google shared drive.

#### Artwork Submissions Stage

- As Chair you will answer any questions and assist people as needed to enter their submissions and direct them to send payment to Treasurer Debi Bloom.
- Once the final submission date is reached, the Chair will provide the submissions to the person creating the Wall Cards (now JoAnne) and the person creating the show booklet (now Nina).
- The Chair will also collect names of volunteers for inclusion in the show booklet and do the work of hanging and preparing for the show and cleaning up after.

#### Judgment Day

- On the day of Judging, the Chair will meet the Judge at B&N to get them oriented and then when the judging is complete, will give the Judge their payment and guard the secret list of winners and get it to Sylvia for Certificates.
- When the Judge finishes their critiques, the Chair will refine the document for distribution after the awards are given out.

#### • Awards Reception

At the Award reception, the Chairs will assist in giving out the certificates.

#### End of Show

 The Charis will assist with take-down and clean up, and then make sure that the exhibit area is left ready for the next show.

Mike & Debi also want to make sure we say directly that being a show Chair is also a great way to meet people in the club and make new friends. You are forced to associate names and faces as you check artwork in and out, arrange for the booklet and manage the awards – so if you want a way to quickly be engaged doing a fun thing – being a chairperson is the way to go!

# RECENT EVENTS: January Speaker Michael Tomb and Marcia Zach, Studio Michaelino



Michael and Marcia presented a very unique, educational and inspirational talk about their unique "Organic Collages" and both the way they are created and the history behind their interest, expertise in the entire field of botanical art and the significant role that Rochester played in the evolution of that art.


First the art work... Michael and Marcia shared some videos and explanation about how they conceptualize an art piece based on real world experiences (such as a meteor shower or a particularly stunning sunset) and then combine that with their in depth knowledge of herbs, fruits, and vegetables and the many colors and textures of their leaves and seeds and fruit and combine that into unique collages that may be a design or may be an actual scene.

For most of us, the range of our knowledge might be the vegetables and fruits we see in the bins at Wegmans ... but for Michael and Marcia, it's a much bigger playing field. Michael spoke of over 500 different kinds of tomatoes – varying in size, shape, color and taste. Similarly, 200 kinds of Pears and many more. The two gather sees for these diverse plants by searching the world, receiving some seeds from collectors in Eastern Europe, sources in Africa, tropical islands and beyond. They then grow and nurture these plants in their own home garden – and it is these plants that eventually become part of their organic collage art.

Next the history ... Michael and Marcia shared information about the history of botanical and seed pack art and the major role that Rochester played in that field.

The names were familiar ... Ellwanger, Vick, Harris, Chase, to list a few. But their role in the seed and garden field and how they made Rochester an international center for flower and vegetable seed distribution was fascinating. I never even knew the many flowers named after Rochester! Here is a link to some of those historic catalogs that Michael spoke of:


## **MEMBER NEWS**

## Laura's "Orthopedic Tree"

When a local Orthopedic surgeon decided to move to California to open a new practice, he reached out to Laura to commission a painting of what is called an "Orthopedic tree" so that he can hang it in his new office.

The tree is inspired by a drawing in a book by Nicholas Andry, the father of orthopedic care, published in 1741. The tree represents people in need of treatment for bone disorders. It is tied with ropes to a sturdy post representing orthopedic surgeons. The surgeon's initials are on the post. (JSL: Jason Scott Lipof). The hamsa symbol on the lower right stands for our hope for his success, happiness, and protection from harm. The surgeon will hang it in his office at Stanford University, where he will continue his career teaching orthopedic techniques and performing surgery.

The custom wooden frame was designed and built by Laura's husband Ed.



## Mike's "Victorian Series"

A fan of Sherlock Holmes style mystery stories set in Victorian times and especially London, Mike decided to take a stab at some paintings related to that. The hope is to someday get good enough to illustrate a Sherlock Holmes story. The result was a series of six 24x24 paintings of various "moody" scenes that might fit with that kind of story.



#### Frazetta Art from Ron

Members Ron Boehner and Mike Kamish are big fans of an artist named Frank Frazetta. To many, he is the unchallenged "master" of Comic and Fantasy Art, with his own museum and paintings that sell for millions.

Frank Frazetta's painting Dark Kingdom (1976) sold for \$6 million at Heritage Auctions in 2023, becoming the world's most valuable work of comic book or fantasy art. It broke a record that stood for three years—set by the same artist at the same house. That one was "Egyptian Queen" that sold for \$5.7M.
